2. The Senate observed a moment of silence for Elizabeth Leo, who passed away last week. She was a lecturer in the English department
3. Chair Hauser moved for approval of the minutes from the Monday, April 8, 2019 meeting. Motion carried.
4. President E. Gordon Gee reported the following:
 - He thanked Dave Hauser for the remarkable job he has done in his faculty leadership role.

- Joyce McConnell will assume the presidency of Colorado State University, a great land-grant institution, in just a few weeks. Provost McConnell has been a transformative leader with a clear agenda of empowerment and a sense of true diversity and inclusion.
- We have a number of transitions taking place, which include the provost leaving, deans retiring or stepping down, people serving in interim roles, and searches about to commence. He views this as exhilarating and opportunistic. We have the opportunity for new and creative people to join us and to take on new roles.
- We have appointed a new provost, Maryanne Reed. He wanted to name an immediate replacement so as not to lose momentum with so many searches and other activities underway. She served as the dean in the College of Media for 16 years. President Gee commented on her energy and creativity.

5. Provost Joyce McConnell reported the following:

- We had a wonderful commencement weekend. She attended seven ceremonies and President Gee attended eight.
- She recognized C.B. Wilson for almost 40 years of service as the associate provost for academic personnel.
- Tracy Morris has been serving as the interim dean of the College of Education and Human Services; Provost McConnell will work with Maryanne Reed during the transition to determine when to launch a search. Ken Blemings is serving as the interim dean in the Davis College; a search will probably be launched at the start of the academic year. Ryan Claycomb is the acting dean of the Honors College. Jack Watson is serving as the interim dean in CPASS. Sue Day-Perroots has made a one-year commitment to serve as the interim dean of Extension. Earl Scime is serving as the interim dean of Statler College. Diana Martinelli was appointed to a 2-year term as dean of the Reed College.
- Katherine Karraker, associate provost for academic affairs, has decided to enter phased retirement on June 30.
- When she began her tenure as provost, she and the president had the goal of establishing centers and institutes that would report directly to the provost to provide campus-wide, cross-disciplinary curriculum and research. As an example, after 5 years we have gone through 3 cohorts of fellows, and all of the pieces are in place for the innovation and entrepreneurship ecosystem.
- Mark Gavin provided an update on fiscal year 2020 budget cuts. The University is facing a budget reduction of \$14.8 million. The single largest reason for the reduction is last fall's enrollment, which decreased by about 500 from the previous year. That enrollment decrease will follow us for 4 years in the budget model. The budget assumes 4900 new students this fall, and is built on the assumptions that retention will increase by .5 percent and persistence will increase by .2 percent. The academic portion of the budget reduction is \$7.1 million plus \$1.1 million for Potomac State and WVU Tech. Targeted reductions were developed by examining 5-year trends in broad sets of instructional and research metrics. The research side was informed primarily by metrics that contribute to our R1 status. Colleges were given differential reduction targets ranging from 2.3 to 10.4 percent. Individual colleges will determine how they meet or offset those reductions.

6. Chair Hauser reported the following:

- The output of the first Faculty Senate working group, conducted in December, helped inform GEFCO's deliberations on potential, revised general education models. A proposed new model will be coming out of GEFCO in the fall. The output of the other working groups related to program success will be sent to the Faculty Welfare Committee, which will come up with a set of metrics for the Faculty Senate to discuss.
- We changed the Faculty Constitution this year to make the June Senate meeting optional. We are still scheduled to meet on June 10. If the Executive Committee determines that we can skip the meeting, we will let everyone know via email. If we do not meet, there will need to be electronic votes on Curriculum Committee and GEFCO courses and programs.
- We had a single candidate for Faculty Senate Chair-Elect. Nathalie Singh-Corcoran will formally begin her term on July 1, when Emily Murphy steps up to be Senate Chair. Dr. Singh-Corcoran has been a very active Senator for several years, and he has high confidence in her Senate leadership abilities.
- Ballots for the membership of the 2019-2020 Executive Committee will be going out on May 14. The ballot will be sent to voting members of the Senate, and will determine the seven elected members of Exec. It will remain open through May 21.
- Senate Committee reports will be presented at the May 20 Executive Committee meeting. However, those reports will not be presented to the Senate until the September meeting. This will allow new Senators to hear what the committees did this year and what they intend to do next year. Incoming chairs of the committees should get together with this year's chairs to sort out who will give the report in September.
- He, Judy Hamilton, Emily Murphy, and Lou Slimak are working on a set of programs/training sessions for August 2019. Members of curriculum-related committees (FSCC, TACO, GEFCO) will receive CIM training, including an explanation of how the committees work together. We will also put together an orientation session for all new Senators before the first meeting in September.
- The Senate voted some time ago to move to plus/minus grades, which would count towards the student's GPA. The intended semester for that to begin was Fall 2021. At the request of the Provost's Office, implementation will likely be delayed.
- Faculty Senate meetings will move to the College of Law beginning in September. The Faculty Senate Office will send reminders for the first meeting next year.

8. Robert Brock, Chair, General Education Foundations Committee, moved for approval of the following report:

9. Ashley Martucci, Chair, Teaching and Assessment Committee, reported that the committee ran a pilot course and section review in Child Development and Engineering. She asked any department that is interested in engaging in the process next year to contact her, Lou Slimak, or Dave Hauser.
10. Roy Nutter, Faculty Representative to State Government, reported the following items from the HEPC meeting he attended on April 26:
 - Sarah Tucker was named the interim chancellor of HEPC. She also serves as the chancellor of the West Virginia Community and Technical College System.
 - The HEPC web site has a new data portal.
 - Thirty percent of high school graduates in West Virginia go on to attend 2-year and 4-year institutions. The goal is 50 percent.
 - The chairman of the Presidents Council noted that the legislature will form a study group this summer on higher education.
 - Promise scholarship requirements will remain the same for 2019-2020.
 - The \$40 million higher education grant program provides about \$2400 per student. This is the state's longstanding needs-based program for post-secondary education. Only about 17,000 students use the award each year.
11. Stan Hileman, BOG Representative, reported the following:
 - The Board met on April 11 in committee meetings and on April 12 for the public meeting.
 - Finance and Administration Rule 5.9 (Procurement) was approved.
 - Six rules were released for comment. May 14 is the last day to comment.
 - The Board received a finance update, approved the minimal tuition increase, discussed renovations of the Evansdale Residential Complex and Hatfield's dining halls, athletic facilities upgrades, and renovations in health sciences.
 - The Board approved committees for evaluation of the president and subsequent compensation. The evaluation committee met with several groups on April 29.
 - Staff Council and the Student Government presented their annual reports to the BOG.
 - The next committee meetings will be at Bechtel Summit on June 20. The public meeting will be held at the Beckley campus on June 21. The faculty presentation to the BOG will take place at the June meeting.
12. Chair Hauser presented Annex IV, Resolution to Create Faculty Senate Sustainability Committee. A motion was made and duly seconded to establish the new committee. Motion carried.
13. In accordance with the Faculty Constitution, the Executive Committee appointed Dave Hauser as the Faculty Secretary for a 3-year term beginning July 1, 2019. Matthew Valenti presented this appointment to the Faculty Senate for confirmation. Dr. Hauser was confirmed unanimously.
14. In accordance with the Faculty Constitution, the Executive Committee appointed Roy Nutter as the Faculty Representative to State Government for the 2019-2020 academic year. The Faculty Representative to State Government also serves as the WVU representative to the West Virginia Advisory Council of Faculty (ACF). Dave Hauser was appointed to serve as the alternate representative to the ACF. Dr. Nutter and Dr. Hauser were confirmed unanimously.

15. New Business

In response to a concern expressed by General Hambrick over the crosswalk on Beechurst Avenue, Mark Gavin indicated that Rob Alsop is working with the West Virginia Division of Highways to address pedestrian traffic and safety.

Following a lengthy discussion, a motion was made and duly seconded for the Faculty Senate Executive Committee to form a committee to collect information and examine issues, including best practices, surrounding the hiring of senior administrators. Ballots were distributed and counted. Motion carried. The Executive Committee will draft a recommendation and committee charge for consideration at a future Faculty Senate meeting.

Title	College	Credits	Prerequisites	Description
DSGN 160: Visual Communications	AGFOR	3	DSM 130 with a C- or better or consent.	Using the design process, this course explores the issues of clarity in graphic communications through 2-dimensional and 3-dimensional representations using computer graphic software. Course also addresses the physical and psychological aspects of human emotions, and non-western social norms and their influence on design process and outcome.
BIOL 457: Ecology of Parasites	AS	3	BIOL 219.	An introduction to the wide diversity of evolved relationships between parasites and their hosts. This course incorporates topics such as gene regulation, cell signaling, animal physiology, and evolution into a complete picture of host/parasite interactions.
COMM 675: Entertainment-Education	AS	3		Survey of current research on entertainment-education theory and applications, a communication strategy that utilizes entertainment media, usually fictional drama, suspense and humor, in order to educate audiences and improve their health, safety, human rights, or other critical social issues.
COMM 685: Media Emotion	AS	3		Introduction to fundamental theories of emotion and survey of current theory and research on how emotions affect people's media selections and influence their experience with media content.
SPAN 610: Methods of Research	AS	3		Fundamentals of literary and cultural research, writing and publishing, both in form and content. Topics include: selection and definition of a corpus of study; formulation and articulation of a research hypothesis; research and evaluation of secondary sources; formats for literary/cultural research projects; online research engines; alternative secondary sources; professional conference presentations; and academic article submissions.
MANG 709: Applied Univariate Statistics	BE	3	Must be enrolled in a WVU Business Economics PhD program or permission of the instructor.	This course is an advanced introduction to applied univariate statistics, emphasizing understanding statistical concepts and methods and building data analysis skills. The goal is to provide a foundation from which students can continue to develop statistics knowledge and skills. The course will cover foundational topics (descriptive statistics, sampling distributions, hypothesis testing, probability) and statistical analyses (chi-square, t-tests, correlation, ANOVA, regression).
CHE 516: Oil Gas Refining	CEMR	3	Graduate Standing and Instructor Approval.	The fundamental principles to analyze refining processes in modern petroleum refineries, chemistry and processes for the conversion of natural gas to products equivalent to those from petroleum.

Resolution to Create Faculty Senate Sustainability Committee

WHEREAS, the Faculty Constitution authorizes the Faculty Senate, by resolution, to establish special committees, and

WHEREAS, issues of sustainability, environmental impact, resources, and the teaching and research of all those areas are important to the overall success of West Virginia University and the faculty thereof, and

WHEREAS, the Faculty Senate seeks to assist the University in assessing our environmental impact, and through our teaching and research work towards an understanding of environmental issues, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Faculty Senate Sustainability Committee is created as a special committee for the 2019 - 2020 academic year, unless sooner altered or terminated by resolution of the Faculty Senate, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Faculty Senate Sustainability Committee shall present a report to the Faculty Senate no less than annually, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Faculty Senate Sustainability Committee be charged with undertaking the following set of actions

- (1) Provide support and assistance to the WVU Office of Sustainability, especially with regard to WVU's sustainability plans and goals.
- (2) Survey faculty with regard to both teaching and research being done at WVU that has relevance to sustainability issues; consider building a database of faculty teaching and research that would allow faculty and staff to communicate with each other on sustainability issues.
- (3) Per a request from WVU's Office of Sustainability, survey the faculty to find out what courses utilize the campus environment in their teaching, as this would give different academic programs a step forward in showing students the full portfolio of sustainability curriculum WVU offers
- (4) Consider the resources necessary to do a carbon-audit of WVU, with respect to our sustainability practices
- (5) Evaluate periodically national trends and report on best practices related to sustainability in teaching and research, and make recommendations to appropriate University bodies including the Office of the Provost, the Teaching and Learning Commons, and other Centers, Colleges, Schools and programs affiliated with the University;

- (6) Report on systems and mechanism that provide support to faculty who engage in research and scholarship on issues related to sustainability
- (7) Address in a timely fashion other issues pertinent to the charge of the committee.
