Major forest types of the United States; their composition, management, problems, and silvicultural treatment. Course had not been taught for a while in previous/discontinued Forest Resources Management (FRM) curriculum and is not part of the curriculum in new Forest Resources & Conservation major (FRC).
HIST 313: France from 1450 to 1750	A&S	3		French history from Charles VII to Louis XV, Italian wars, religious conflict, absolutism, economic and commercial developments, philosophes. Focus on the evolution of national political and cultural unity between the Renaissance and Enlightenment.
